Ethical Leadership

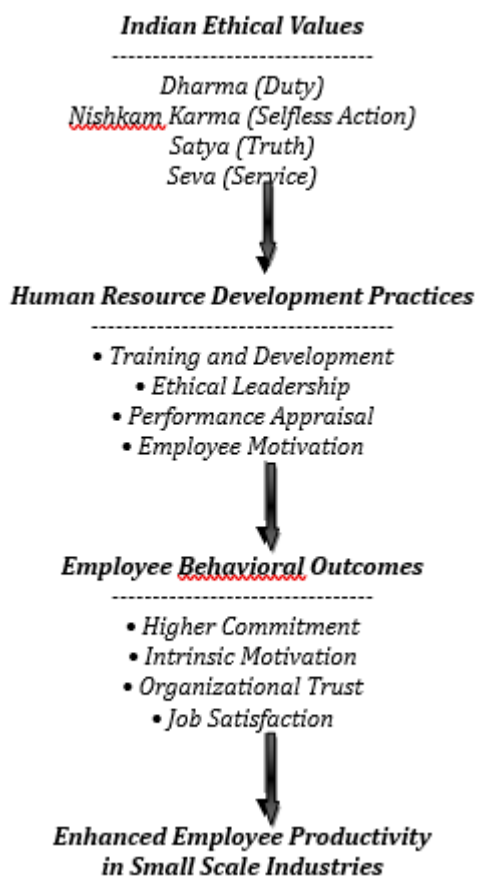
Leaders play a crucial role in shaping organizational culture. Ethical leadership promotes fairness, transparency, and accountability within the workplace.

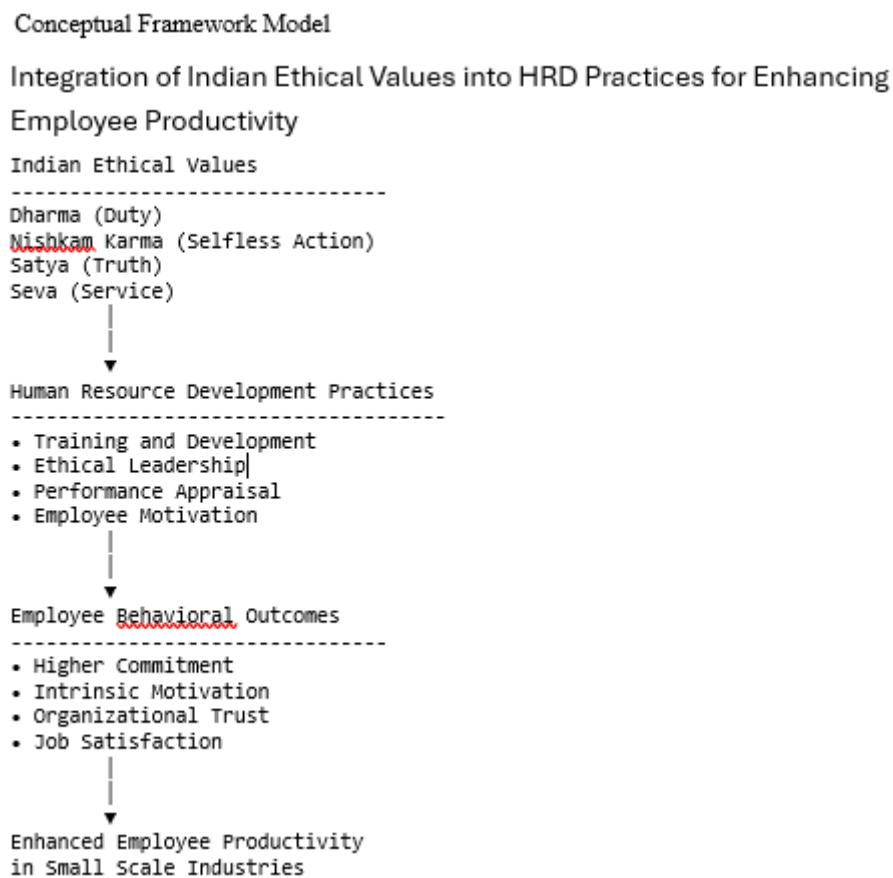
